The state Sunday school convention to be held Oct. 10-12 at Reading will be an event of more than ordinary interest in the religious world. The people of Reading have made elaborate preparations for the sessions and are determined to outstrip in hospitality all their predecessors. Rev. Dr. Sweeney, the state secretary, predicts that this will be the best convention of Sunday schools ever held in Pennsylvania.

The convention proper will open on Tuesday evening, Oct. 10, but Tuesday morning and afternoon will be given up to work connected with the convention. This work will be in the shape of a "field workers' conference." "The Modern Bible School of the Church" will be the general theme and there will be a general discussion of county association work. The presidents and secretaries of a number of county Sunday school associations will present papers on vital topics. This conference will end with an address by Hugh Cork on "House to House Visitation."

There will be greetings and addresses on Tuesday evening. Rev. Dr. Wilbur J. Charman will discuss upon "Spirituism in All Our Work," and John Wanamaker will make the annual president's address. H. J. Heinz, of Pittsburg, will preside at this meeting. At subsequent sessions Mr. Wanamaker will preside.

Wednesday morning will be devoted chiefly to reports from the presidents of primary work, of the normal department, etc. In the afternoon Mrs. J. W. Barnes will conduct a conference on primary work and Rev. Dr. Forest E. Dager will make an address on "Next Sabbath's Lessons Taught." Prof. H. M. Hamill will speak on "Graded Schools" and Rev. Dr. G. S. Chambers, of Harrisburg, on "Teachers' Meetings." In the evening the graduation exercises of the state normal department will be conducted by Rev. H. A. Bomberger. Dr. Dager will speak on "Teacher's Training" and Dr. Wallace Macmillan, of Philadelphia, on "Evangelistic Sabbath School Work."

Thursday work will include conferences on house to house visitation conducted by Hugh Cork, state superintendent of house to house visitation, and on "Modern Methods in Sunday School Work," conducted by Prof. Hamill. Prof. Edwin J. Houston, the famous expert on electricity and boys, will tell in the afternoon "What to Do with the Boys." Later there will be a conference on the home department, conducted by Rev. H. A. Bomberger, of the Lutheran Board of Publication. Four mass meetings for Sunday school scholars will conclude the work of the afternoon. In the evening Rev. C. B. Schneider, of Shamokin, will make an address on "The Great Teacher," and the international field secretary, will speak on "The International Field." This will be followed by impressive farewell exercises.

Rev. R. F. Y. Pierce will deliver the second of the series of sermons to laboring men and their friends tomorrow evening at the Penn Avenue Baptist church. The topic is a popular one, "The Workingman's Paradise, or the Making of a Home." Attractive music; earnest, practical heart to heart gospel talks, and the cordial welcome given by the congregation to the strangers, in meeting with popular favor and many men especially are being helped through the services.
