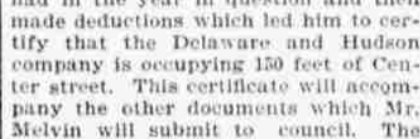

FORTY-FIVE HUNDRED OF THEM WERE IN LINE.
