CARBONDALE.

LOOKS BAD FOR CONSOLIDATED.

Artesian Wells Are Flowing Copious ly-Opposition Increasing.

The Consolidated Water company which paid the Crystal Lake people ten dollars for one will soon meet more serious opposition than it has evidently anticipated. The last bill of \$1,054.61 against the city has been turned down by common council, \$578,-75 was what the old company charged for the same service and no more will be paid without a legal battle.

Still more serious opposition will be likely to result from the success which is attending the sinking of artesian wells. At the Hendrick works the well is 500 feet deep and is flowing 3,240 barrels of water a day. At Mr Hendrick's residence the well is about 500 feet deep and while little water has been struck the indications are favorable. At the silk mill on upper Belmont street, at a depth of 600 feet a flow of 75 gallons a minute has been obtained and with a pump it can be increased to 250.

FOR LAW AND HONESTY.

Councils Award Sewer Contract to Lowest Bidders-Other Business.

One week ago Saturday The Tribune made a plain statement of facts -facts which had hitherto been suppressed by evil influences-concerning the efforts of some members of councils to give the contract for surface water sewers to contractors not the lowest bidders. Publicity had its usual salutary effect and last night both branches of councils passed unanimonsly the resolution of James Thompson awarding the contract to Giles & Loveland, the lowest bidders for \$6, 606.75,

The joint session held pursuant to a call by the mayor adopted a resolution for the erection of the fire alarm system on the poles of the Electric Light and telephone companies, largely in accordance with propositions submitted by these corporations. General Manager Bevan addressed the solons and said his company was willing to concede points if council would meet it half way. The principal stipulations are that the poles shall be exempt from taxation and that the fire alarm company be required to put on arms for the stringing of wires. The prospects are that work will soon be commenced.

An American Saved Kruger.

An American who was in South Afica during the Boer war tells the following story of how he saved President Kruger from death, or at any rate from captivity.

He was in Bloemfontein at the time when Oom Paul, General Joubert, and Pretorius, the head of the Boer gov-

ernment, went there to beg President Brandt, head of the Orange Free State, assist the Transvaal against the

British. While passing down the main street he was stopped by an Englishman, who

rapidly detailed to him a plan whereby a band of British colonists were to kidnap the three Boer officials on their return to the Transvaal that evening, and carry them into Griqualand West The Englishman explained that this

coup would end the war, and invited the American to assist.

The Yankee replied that as an American citizen he could not join the enterprise, more especially as he sympathized with the Boers. He, however, promised not to divulge the plot.

He observed the letter but not the spirit of his pledge. Entering the hotel where the three Boer magnates were dining, he sat down by Oom Paul and made a casual suggestion that the party should return home earlier than at first intended, in order to have as
