RIVAL OF THE TROUT.

Experiments to Be Tried with Black and Rock Bass.

From the Stroudsburg Times.

A new enterprise engages the atten tion of the Pennsylvania fish commission, and experiments will soon be started at the stations at Allentown and Corry, heretofore devoted to the beings. hatching of trout. This is the cultivation of black and rock bass, fish which are rapidly superseding trout in popufor food and angling purposes. The general public in particular desires the propagation of bass, be cause they will make themselves at home anywhere, almost, whereas the dainty trout requires running water, crystal clear. Moreover, the bass had in advantage over the trout that he can better hold his own against nataral enemies in the shape of larger ish with voracious appetites. There are a great many of these, prominent tmong them the terrible pickerel, or resh-water shark, so-called, which nides, assassin-like in dark corners and then pounces on its victims, killng them even when it does not require

Unfortunately, while the eggs of the shad, trout, white fish, pike, perch and many others can be removed and subected to artificial hatching, cause of the black and rock bass can not. This is a freak of nature which greatly puzgles the fish culturists. All that can be done is to assist nature, to surround the spawning fish and their young with advantageous conditions and protection from the perils of natural life.

### EUROPE WILL NOT INTERFERE

NOTHING TO INDICATE COALI-TION AGAINST ENGLAND.

Belief That Great Britain Is on the Verge of a Crisis Lacks Confirmation-Remarkable Military and Naval Activity Have No Special Bearings on England's European Relations-All Nations Neutral.

London, Oct. 25 .- The belief that Great Britain is on the verge of a risis, or even a conflict far greater than that in the Transvaal, has many supporters, though the lack of all oficial confirmation favors the conservative view that the remarkable military and naval activity is due to a desire to take thorough precautions and that the warlike preparations, though ominous, have at the present time no special bearing on Great Brit-European relations. Advices from the continent strengthen that view. For instance, the Fremdenblatt, of Vienna, today says:

"Nothing points to the eventual intervention of Europe in favor of the Beers.

The paper adds that Germany especially has resolved "not to depart from her attitude of neutrality." It is said that Rear Admiral Lord Charles Beresford will command the Mediterranean squadron, and details of the activity at the dock yard and naval stations are coming fast.

The Associated Press learns however, that whether or not Great seriously fears Russia or French aggression, the naval preparations have been under consideration for several months, and it was the admiralty's intention to put them in force as soon as war with the Transvaal had been declared, deeming it necessary to increase the active strength of the navy in order to ensure the large fleet of transports against every possible contingency. Whether later developments have transformed the admiralty's precautionary measures into preparations for a naval demonstration necessitated by European hostility is the question of the hour and it is as much a mystery to many high naval officers is to the public

The most significant action in the promulgation of the order for the naval reserves to be in readiness to rejoin their ships at twenty-four hours' notice, and for all the cruisers of the reserve class to be ready to sail in the though at the dock yards, are never out of commission and are always supposed to be ready for immediate

In this letter to the Civil Service ommission it is alleged that the letters to government employes were printed on letter heads of the finance ommittee and it is pointed out that these letters explicitly state that the money solicited is to be applied to use of the full committee of which Mr. Dick is chairman.

It is alleged further that the circular has been sent to thousands of government subordinates in all parts of the country, including even clerks and other minor employes in the New York ustom house.
