DRAGGED BY A MULE.

George Jordan Frightfully Injured Yesterday Afternoon.

George, the little eight-year-old son of Michael Jordan, of the West Side, was frightfully injured yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock on Dundaff street. He was riding on the mine mules, when the animal became frightened and threw him off. He caught in the harness and was dragged nearly an eighth of a mile to the mule barn, near Conover's hardware.

The unfortunate lad was bruised and torn from head to foot. He sustained deep gashes in the neck and under arm; the skin was scraped from his nose and he is suffering concussion of the brain. About an hour after being admitted to the Carbondale Emergency hospital he became unconscious and was still in that condition at the hour last night. It is feared his injuries will prove fatal.

INDIGNANT PARENTS.

Many parents of Park street have expressed in strong terms their indignation over the failure of the health department to placard the McDonald house, in which a child died of meninges.

Notice was not put up until more than twenty-four hours had elapsed from the time the physician reported the case. During the interim school teachers and school children were exposed to the deadly malarial. There was further dereliction in allowing the remains to be kept nearly three days when the humane burial in such cases within twenty-four hours.

HAD A KIDNEY REMOVED.

The nineteen-year-old son of John Morrison, who had a kidney removed at Scranton recently, was admitted to the Carbondale hospital yesterday afternoon. He is suffering an abscess at the seat of the operation and Dr. Gibbons, of Scranton, is expected here today to operate for the draining of the abscess.
