TRouble in Water Camp.

—Borough Loses the Case
—Against J. D. Stocker—Coming
Fairs—Will Boundy Arrives at Dawson.

The borough council met in regular session last evening, Dunn, of the First ward, and Nicholson and Stanton, of the Third ward, being absent. It was announced that the arbitrators had rendered a decision in the sidewalk case of the borough versus J. D. Stocker, adverse to the borough. The case was talked over informally by the members present and it was decided to consult the attorney, who has represented the borough's interest in the matter, and if necessary call a special council meeting for the purpose of authorizing an appeal to the Supreme court.

The following bills were read and payment ordered: Chief of police, salary, \$45; Water company, for hydrants, \$56.25; Electric Light company, \$19.25; Patrick Burdick, \$3; J. J. Clarke, \$2.25; H. D. Swick, \$9.69; Sam Sampson, \$3.75; Mrs. Mary, \$5.88; A. B. Dunning, Jr., \$18. A special bill of C. D. Winter & Co. was laid over.

A communication from M. J. Eagan, offering to put in a heater to heat the borough building for \$98, was read, but as council had not authorized the putting in of a heater there was some feeling about the resolution. The members in the discussion, the following: Councilman H. D. Swick had the secretary read a resolution authorizing Mr. Eagan to put in a furnace at the price quoted, Mr. Edmunds left the room. He, however, afterwards returned. Messrs. Davis, Edmunds and Moon said there was no doubt the furnace was needed, but he thought council should proceed in a different manner if they contemplated making the improvement. The resolution was then put and defeated. Messrs. Badger and Swick voting in the affirmative and Messrs. Moon, Davis, Edmunds and Burdick in the negative. The request for an additional arc light near the powder mill was again laid over for another month, and council afterwards adjourned.

In addition to the fair of the Artesian Water company, which opens next Wednesday in Entice hall, in fact that of the Hornard band, which is to be held in Windsor hall next month, it is just announced that the congregation of Sacred Heart church will also hold a fair between Christmas and the new year.

Thomas Boundy yesterday received a telegram from his son, Will, saying he had arrived in Dawson City safely. This was probably the first telegram ever received in Jermyr direct from Dawson.
