OLD COLLIERY TO BE OPERATED.

The Butler breaker, situated near the Carbondale yard of the Ontario and Western company, just outside the city line in Fell township, has again changed hands. Among the Carbondalians interested in this breaker were John J. Simpson and the Pattersons, and the property probably changed hands a dozen times before they acquired it. It was originally the Albright tract and has been under control of the Acme Coal company, Stroud & Chamberlain and at one time a Mr. Hutchinson and Jonathan Vipond. 


