MARCONI LEAVES AMERICA.

Has Sold the American Rights for Wireless Telegraphy.

New York, Nov. 8.—Sig. Guglielmo Marconi, the inventor of the system of wireless telegraphy, sailed for Southampton this morning on the American Line steamship St. Paul.

Speaking of his work in this country, Sig. Marconi said: "My work here has been very successful, and, in addition, I have been treated well and met many nice persons. I am coming back again in the spring. Of course, nothing new was discovered by my wireless telegraphy work here, but everything was successful. Messages were sent and received through dense fog and in the most unfavorable conditions of weather."
