

London, Nov. 9 .- The constant delays in the departure of British transports owing to the bad quality of the food supplies shipped by the contractors is occasioning a seandal and great indignation. The Arawa yesterday had to be delayed twenty-four hours owing to the fact that 15,000 pounds of rotten English colonial beef and mutton had to be replaced.
