

EVENTS OF DAY IN WEST SCRANTON

OVER \$2,900 PLEDGED FOR JACKSON STREET CHURCH.

Voluntary Pledges Amounting to \$1,200 Were Received at Last Evening's Service—Members Making Strenuous Efforts to Cancel Mortgage—Contractor Ezra Barden Missing—Enjoyable Children's Party—Funeral of Mrs. Martin Maloney—Other Items of Interest.

The members of the Jackson Street Baptist church are making a strenuous effort to free themselves from the indebtedness which has overshadowed their edifice for several years, and judging from present indications they will succeed.

A reply was received on November 3, stating that the mortgage was willing to make the sacrifice and allow the sale, and accepted the proposition made by the friend of the church.

A week ago yesterday pledge cards were distributed among the members of the church and congregation and last evening they were returned to the official board, with pledges for over \$1,200.

The members need the moral and financial support of the citizens of Scranton and will appreciate any assistance given them in the present efforts to wipe out their indebtedness.

The raising of \$5,000 at this time means a clear saving of \$7,000 to them, and the timely assistance rendered the church by one of the most philanthropic men of this city is an evidence of good faith in the people connected with the church.

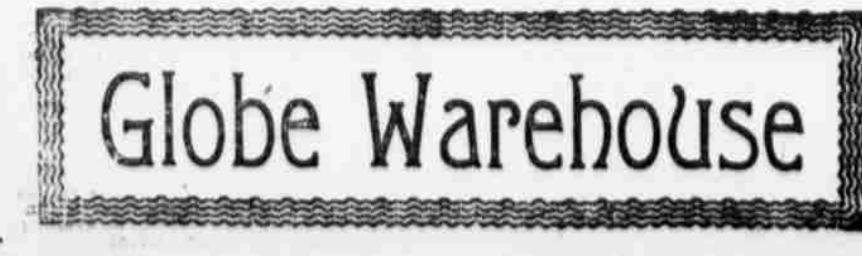
