The members of the Jackson Street Baptist church are making a strennous effort to free themselves from the indebtedness which has overshadowed their edifice for several years, and judging from present indications they will succeed. A mortgage to the amount of \$13,000 has been held by Eli K. Price, of Philadelphia, against the church property, and on September 7 of the present year a friend of the church made an offer to Mr. Price of \$6,000 for gale of the mortgage.

Thomas de Gruchy, immedistely set to work raising the necessary funds and is meeting with much succuragement. He has already colof \$500 each towards the necessary amount.

A week ago yesterday pledge cards were distributed among the members of the church and congregation and hist evening they were returned to the official board, with pledges for over \$1,200. Together with the money already pledged and the persistent offorts being made, the members confidently expect to realize the necessary tomorrow evening. amount within the next thirty days.

Rev. de Gruchy spent the past week in Philadelphia and received much enagain this week for the same purpose. The members need the moral and fi-nancial support of the citizens of Scranton and will appreciate any assistance given them in the present efforts to wipe out their indebtedness.

The raising of \$6,000 at this time means a clear saving of \$7,000 to them, and the timely assistance rendered the church by one of the most phllanthropic men of this city is an evidence of good faith in the people connected with the church. The property is one of the most valuable in the city and was built at a cost of nearly \$20,000. It is located on Jackson street, between Hyde Park and Bromley avenue, and has a fronting of nearly half a block.
