# LATEST WATER MOVE.

Formal Protest to Be Forwarded to Governor Stone-Councils Doings. Select council met last evening and after listening to an address on "Municipal Ownership of the Water by Reese Hughes, of the com-Plant" mittee of one hundred, the following

concurrent resolution was adopted: Whereas, an application has been made to the governor of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the granting of a charter to a corporation to be called the Carbondale Artesian Water company, one of whose alleged purposes is the supply of water to the citizens of Carbondale, and that other applications for like purposes are in contemplation, and

"Whereas, the citizens of said city in mass meeting assembled and by petition have expressed a determination that the city should own its own water plant, and that the proper and legal steps with that end in view are now being taken, be it

"Resolved, that John W. Kilpatrick, mayor of Carbondale, Pa., under the seal of said city, attested by the clerk, be instructed and authorized to protest against the granting of the said charter to the Carbondale Artesian Water company for a like purpose until the question of municipal water is settled for or against. And, that said application for charter and all other applications for a like purpose be con tinued Until March 1, 1900, at which time the question of municipal ownership will be definitely settled. And, further, that a certified copy of this pesolution be forwarded to the governor of Pennsylvania with such protest."

Council postponed action on the Park street improvement ordinance until April, 1900.


