It is the general concensus of opinion among the members of the board of trade that never before in that body's history has the outlook for the final establishment of a proposed industry been so favorable. line, are circulating a petition to be sent to the head officials of the com-

Mr. Torbet, when seen last evening, was especially enthusiastic. He said: "I have looked over all the plots of land on which we hold options and I think that the West Side sites are as favorable as any, if not more so. The people of this section of the city, I am told, have long been crying for an industry. Here is their chance now, but in order to secure the factory it will be necessary for them to come up with liberal subscriptions of stock and to come to the front handsomely.

"The company is to be capitalized at \$250,000 instead of \$200,000, as at first proposed, and the chances of securing this amount seems to me to be about as favorable as they can possibly be. Large subscriptions from \$25,000 down, and there will be several of these, will be received first and it is proposed to secure the remainder of the stock by popular or small subscriptions, allowing the public at large to have an in-
