COUNTY HAS MADE SOME BIG STRIDES

INTERESTING FIGURES CON-TAINED IN REPORT.

In Less Than a Decade Lackawanna Has Increased in Valuation from \$23,337,038 to \$35,234,151, or in Other Words Scranton Is Valued Higher at Present Than the Whole County Was in 1890-Timber Land Rapidly Decreasing in Area-Comparisons with 1897, 1898 and Also with 1890.

The county commissioners yesterday completed the annual assessment report to be forwarded to the secretary of internal affairs.

Below are given the totals, together with the totals of 1897 and 1898, and also of 1899, by which some interesting comparisons can be made to show how the county is rapidly growing in wealth. In nine years, for instance, the aggregate value of all taxable property has increased from \$23,333,058 to \$25,234,151. The value of real estate in Scranton city alone is greater now than the whole valuation of the county was in 1830. There were 51,584 acres of timber land in the county nine years ago. This year the returns show only 38,025 acres.
