THANKSGIVING DAY QUIETLY OBSERVED.

The usual observance of Thanksgiving day was noticeable in West Scranton yesterday, and aside from the religious services in the churches, nothing occurred to mar the solemnity of the occasion. The majority of the business places were closed and the usual family gatherings were held in many homes. The religious services in the morning were well attended, and the younger element enjoyed the various foot ball games in the afternoon.

The first services of the day were conducted in the Plymouth Congregational church, where the members of the Baptist Young People's union, the Christian Endeavor societies and Epworth leagues held a union prayer meeting. At 10:30 o'clock the customary union services were held in the Washburn Street Presbyterian church, where Rev. J. B. Sweet preached the annual sermon. Other morning services were held at St. David's Episcopal church, during the afternoon and evening Rev. David Jones spoke at the First Welsh Congregational church, and the choir of the Tabernacle Congregational church, assisted by Stenner's orchestra, took part in the services at the latter church.

Members of the Home Missionary societies provided Thanksgiving luxuries for a large number of poor families, and added much to make the members happy and contented. The pupils of the public schools also worked along similar lines and performed pleasant duties.

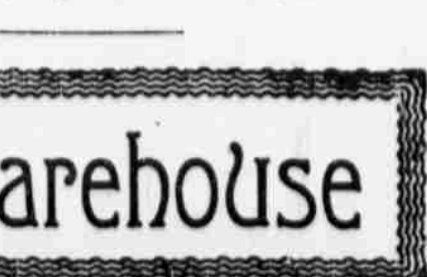
