Council Meeing-Councilman Moon Objects to Paying Interest on Artesian Water Bonds-Mr. and Mrs. Stocker Serenaded by the Glee Club. Other Newsy Items.

The borough council held their monthly meeting last evening. Superintendent Gebhardt was present and asked to have an arc light placed near the powder mill. The matter has been before the council for several months past, but for some unknown reason it has remained in abeyence. Before the council had time to reply to Mr. Gebhardt's request last evening he made A proposition to the council, stating that if council would use twenty-three are lights the company would furnich them for \$72.50 per light per year. If they would take twenty-five lights the company would reduce the charge to \$70 per year. At present the borough has but eighteen lights; to get the reduction of \$2,50 per light it was therefore necessary to use five more lights, but this council refused, but decided to put in three more lights, one at the powder mill, one on the east side and another near Second and Division streets.
