### DAY'S DOINGS IN DUNMORE BOROUGH

HOUSE OF JOHN COLEMAN DE- N STROYED BY FIRE.

Was Located on Sport Hill-The Damage Is \$1,200, Which Is Partly Covered by Insurance-The Funeral of the Late Charles McKinney Will Be Held Today-Yesterday's Services at the Various Churches-Unclaimed Letters at the Postoffice-Other News Notes.

An alarm of fire sounded by the gong Saturday morning at 3 o'clock, caused considerable excitement among the residents of this borough and brought the Neptune and Independent companies out with a rush. The fire was located on Sport Hill, about three blocks up the hill from the corners, and proved to be the frame dwelling houses owned by John Coleman, but unoccupled for several weeks back.

Several streams of water were soon playing on the building, but in the course of a short time it was a burning mass and a general alarm was sounded. By the time the other companies had arrived the flames were under control and the surrounding property considered safe. The cause of the fire is unknown. Mr. Coleman's loss will reach \$1,200, but is partly covered by insurance.
