An Engineer's Troubles. Passengers in the coaches don't mind it, but the men in the engine are caused considerable annoyance, if not positive worry. You see these big flakes are soft, and as soon as they strike a window they stick there like glue. Running through the storm at a fifty mile an hour clip and the front window of the cab covered with snow isn't the pleasantest thing in the world and I hope the snow fall will cease before I start on my return trip to Carbondale. "An engineer must look ahead, and if anything obscures his view in front he has but one alternative—open the window and thrust his head out. The snow fills his eyes, drops down the back of his neck and gathers in big globules on his mustache, but he isn't in a position to register a kick, and is compelled to take his medicine. A man is in danger of catching all kinds of colds, but he doesn't pull his head in 'out of the wet.' It's a bad day for our business," he concluded as he hastened back to his engine."
