



The paragraphs of the message bearing on the subject of industrial combinations was the ground for the special weakness in the industrials. Quite a number of these securities are from 1 to 3 points lower on the day. A single lot of United States milling preferred sold at 12 against 22% on the last preceding sale. But the principal influence in the weakness was the money situation. The spasmodic character of the selling and the exceedingly dullness of the intervening periods reflected the operation of loan contraction by the banks, the successive calling of loans throwing blocks of securities upon the market, which found no support awaiting them. There were some slight signs of firmness in the early dealings, especially in


