## CARBONDALE.

JOHN H. THOMAS' WARNING.

Postmaster J. H. Thomas has sent the appended letter to councils. It explains itself:

"Gentlemen: I beg leave to call your attention to the subject of putting up the names of streets and numbering the houses. In other cities postmasters are being ordered to furnish reports from the mail carriers as to the number of street corners marked and unmarked and the number of houses numbered and unnumbered on the several routes. A call of this kind to a nearby town a few months ago was followed by an order to suspend free delivery of mail on unmarked streets and unnumbered houses.

"The same course will no doubt be followed here, and I would suggest the immediate attention of the councils to this matter, for when an order will have been received from the post office department there can be no delay in its enforcement and it will be a great hardship to many people to be compelled to come a long distance to the post office for their mall.
