#### LIVE NEWS OF THE INDUSTRIAL WORLD

CONDITION OF ANTHRACITE COAL MARKET.

Set Forth in the December Letter of the Operators' Association-Demand Is Greater Than the Supply and There Is No Probability of Lower Prices Until Spring-D., L. & W. Board for Today-Subscriptions for the Proposed Tin Plate Plant

With reference to the present concition of the anthracite coal market the December letter of the Anth acite Coal Operators' association says.

The past month has fully justified

the predictions made during the sum-mer as to a scarcity of fuel. At every point of the market this difficulty has been experienced. From Maine to Minnesota there have been complaints, and it has been only because of the moderate weather that the shortage has not caused more serious consequences. Prices have been firm, as might be expected under these conditions, and concessions have been rare. Such coal as has gone forward on old orders has not been sufficient to disturb the market at any point nor has the angle. ket at any point, nor has the an-nouncement of the construction of a new railroad from the mines to tide been a disturbing factor in prices.

The Western market has been favored by the mild weather which has permitted shipments by the lakes, but the scarcity of vessels and high prices charged have forced an unusual proportion of coal to go by rail. The same difficulty as to vessels has been ex-perienced in the New England market. Recently, vessel rates from Baltimore to Boston were \$2 per ton, and a schooner from Philadelphia to Augusta, Maine, received \$3.50 per ton.
As showing the unusual demand, the following figures give the receipts of coal at Boston from January 1 to De-cember 4, 1899;

With the beginning of December the companies find themselves unable to fill all of the orders offered for prompt delivery. Even allowing for the tonnage available now that Lake ravigation has closed it is doubtful whether tion has closed it is doubtful whether the total of December deliveres will equal the demand. This would have equal the demand. This would have serious results, especially in the Eastern market where the dealers have had an extraordinary demand for anthractic, owing to the scarcity of bituminous coal. The quantity of coal going to market represents the maximum production. There are neither cars or motive power to move a greater tonnage, and further, if there was abundant transportation, the mines are so hampered by the general scarcity of miners and laborers, that they would not be able to add to their output, and in event of cold weather there are no surplus stocks which can be drawn upon.

with the demand greater than the supply, it is evident that no lower prices can be looked for until spring since even should the working time in January, February and March be in-creased, the excess over the normaconsumption during these months would not be more than sufficient to meet the extraordinary demand and bring stocks to a safe amount.

Nellie Smith, of 321 centre Street,




