

EVENTS OF DAY IN WEST SCRANTON

IMPORTANT MEETING OF WEST SIDE BOARD OF TRADE.

Definite Action Taken Relative to the Dangerous Condition of West Lackawanna Avenue Crossing and the Tin Plate Industry—Fifth Ward Republicans Will Caucus Saturday, Dec. 23—Man Knocked Down and Run Over on Main Avenue—Other Interesting Items.

The West Side board of trade, at its regular meeting last evening, took definite action relative to the dangerous condition which confronts the public at the West Lackawanna avenue crossing, and the vital question received merited consideration.

A committee was appointed to confer with the officials of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad regarding the unnecessary delays at the crossing and the danger encountered by so much switching at that point, and they will ask the street railway company to place a flagman at the crossing to signal the cars on their approaching the tracks.

The viaduct question was discussed at some length, and the committee was instructed to talk viaduct to the officials of both companies, and urge upon them the necessity of taking immediate action in the matter.

One of the members said he counted 67 teams and 76 persons delayed at the crossing on one occasion recently. Definite action was also taken relative to the location of a tin plate industry in the Keyser Valley.
