A report of Superintendent Garr, of the public schools shows that the entire number in attendance from the beginning of the term to date is 2,344. The average attendance: Male, 1,013; female, 1,050: total average attendance, 2.094. The average percentage of attendance is 94. The number of pupils perfect in attendance is 1.022. Number of pupils suspended, 8; corporal punishments, 45; times pupils were tardy, 655; foreign pupils, 5 teachers absent, 5; visits of citizens, 52; of directors, 27; of superintend-ent, 140; teachers' meetings, 4.
