That the plant has been run in A very unbusiness-like manner is apparent from the action of a large number who have discontinued the use of electricity in their business places and homes, At the present time the borough is paying about \$1,000 a year for having the streets lighted, and as it is understood that the plant can be purchased for \$15,000. The interest on a loan of that amount would be less than it costs at present for lighting purposes. The action of the council will be watched with interest.






