

# BEARING IN THE DAVIS CASE IS CONCLUDED.

Davenports Allege That They Signed the Lease Under a Wrong Impression and Further Charge That Certain Papers Entered in the Case Are Forgeries-Three Important Cases Are Continued, Among Them the Poplar Street Fence Case. Murder Case Before Grand Jury.

In equity court yesterday the hearing of the case of Thomas Davis against the Lackawanna Coal company, limited, was concluded before Judge Savidge and Wednesday next fixed as the time for hearing argu-

The defence was, as told in yesterday's Tribune, that Davis' leasehold had lapsed by reason of his failure to begin mining within a specified time and further that the lease was signed by the Davenports under a misappre-

Mr. and Mrs. Davenport both testified that they were led to believe they were to receive \$20,000 for their interest in the property, but it afterwards developed that the agreement which they had been induced to make would give them much smaller returns. They further alleged that certain papers entered in the case purporting to bear their signatures were forgeries.
