The man is a stranger here and was seeking employment in the various tailor shops just before the accident occurred. He is a widower and has five children living in Syracuse, N. Y. O'Holleran also stated to a reporter that he has a brother residing in One Hundred and Eighth street, New York city. The police will communicate with his relatives.
