Oak tables surmounted by mirrors, supplied with electric lights, ornamented with green shades, are more suggestive of the boudoir than the prison; nevertheless, they will be found there. The conversation room, exclusively reserved for the prisoners and well supplied with books, newspapers and easy chairs, will certainly tend to make the Sante prison more popular than the club, especially as, in addition to a splendid bath room, the prison boasts of a garden planted with beautiful shrubs, which will be illuminated during the summer months by electricity, and perhaps the French government will provide a military band as well. The prisoners on the occasion of the

riots last year in Italy did not have an altogether bad time, on the whole, They occupied the same large chamber, and, when not discussing various questions of the day, or reading and writing letters, each took turns at composing a novel, the length of each senarate contribution being one para-

graph. The Finnish prison for debtors at Helsingfors was a cheap and pleasant boarding house until the last day of 1896, when it was closed, it having occurred to the rate payers who did not habitually use it that it was an expensive luxury.
