SAMES G. BAILEY SPEAKS IN FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH.

Addressed Rev. Mathews' Congregation on the Subject "Filled with the Spirit"-Annual Meeting and Election of St. Peter's T. A. B. Society-Demented Man Died at the Hospital-Little Folks Entertained-News of the Churches. Funerals and Other Notes.

At the first Baptist church yesterday morning, James G. Bailey spoke on the subject "Filled with the Spirit," and took his text from Acts, xix:2: "He said unto them, Have you received the Holy Ghost since you believed? And they said unto him. We have not so much as heard whether there be any Holy Ghost." He spoke, in part, as follows: "These are the words of Paul to

twelve disciples at Ephesus. Since realized that only through the Spirit could be completely do his Master's will, he naturally upon meeting them inquires if they have received the Holy Ghost: and not only learns that they have not received it, but also that they have not so much as heard whether there be any Holy Ghost. In these later days there is much heard and said, as Paul phophesied there would be, about spirits, divinations and such things. Sometimes our minds are clouded in regard to these, more so in the younger ones, and when we speak of the Holy Ghost they have a wrong conception about the matter.

"The Holy Ghost, also called Spirit and Comforter, for that is one of his chief missions, is that power invisible, considered as a person, which works directly between God and man, and makes known to man God's desires. Although from the creation the power of the Spirit has been manifested. nevertheless his true office was not established until after the death of Christ.






