THE MAYOR'S ESTIMATES.

Mayor Kilpatrick has given out the following figures concerning municipal water:

"Assuming that there are thirty miles of water mains in this city and that the cost would be \$5,000 a mile, this only makes \$150,000. I believe it will not cost \$50,000 to put in a plant. But say it does; this makes a total cost of \$200,000. There must be at least 5,000 taps in the city which at \$6 each, to say nothing about the other uses of water, would make \$30,000 year. The interest on \$200,000 at 6 per cent. is \$12,000 and suppose it cost \$3,00 year to run it, would make but \$15,-100. There would be \$15,000 left to apply on the principal each year, thus will be seen that at that rate in a few years the city will own its own plant. We can't issue bonds. That 'i the question, but the committee feels certain they can get men with plenty of money to come here and put in this plant. Each succeeding year the principal would be reduced, so that in a decade or more the city would own the works. Thus no one has been taxed a cent. He has simply paid for




