## The Industrial Census.

An official statement relative to the industrial census has been sent out from Washington as follows:

"The Census act provides that the statistics of manufacturers may be collected by enumerators or by special agents, at the discretion of the director. He may designate certain cities, towns, or other manufacturing centers, in which the manufacturing schedule shall be withheld from the enumerators and placed in the hands of special agents. A list of such cities and towns has been prepared, numbering in the aggregate over a thousand, and a careful estimate shows that all of the manufacturing establishments included in the localities to be withdrawn from the enumerators can be visited and returns from them secured, within the brief space of thirty days, by the employment of two thousand special agents, who will be paid by the day. Orders to Vacate Land.

The Pennsylvania Coal company has served notice on all who have properties on the company's grounds in Avoca and vicinity to remove them or vacate the premises before April 1. This order has caused considerable alarm and many are at a loss to learn what the company really means by serving such notices.

Ten years ago the company offered the ground for sale at reasonable figures and many people took advantage of the offer and are now independent. The company has always charged a small ground rent and those who did not buy willingly acquiesced to the demands, but this last order comes as a

surprise. It is said from a reliable source that the company will not deal harshly with the property holders, but that an advance in the sale of lots and also in the rents will be asked. Surveyors are at work mapping out the site of the new yard, which will make the capacity 1,000 more cars than the old yard.

"In the collection of manufacturing statistics, the Director proposes to utilize as far as possible the organization created for the general enumeration by placing the supervisor of census of the proper district in charge by grouping the localities withdrawn, and by employing the best of the enumerators for an additional month as special agents.

"It will thus be seen that opportunities for the employment of men not employed as enumerators will be limited. and that the amount to be earned by the special agents is not large.

"The reasons for adopting the system here outlined are two, namely, economy in expenditures and the desire to meet the wish of congress for a "quick" census."

Striking Patchers Reinstated. General Superintendent Richards has reinstated all the striking patchers at he Hollenback mine and work has een resumed. When the miners heard of the company's intention to shut down the mine they spoke plainly to the patchers and the latter agreed to return to work, providing Superintendent Richards would reinstate them. The employes at the mine are pleased that the trouble is at an end. Of the three strikes on last week in Wilkes-Barre, the only one now remaining is that at Baltimore, No. 3.

## Large Order for Engines.

The Baldwin locomotive works have secured another large order for engines from France. The order, which is for thirty large ten-wheeled passenger engines, is from the Paris & Orleans Railroad, and is the first order for locomotives ever placed by the company with an American firm-In design and manner of construction these engines will differ little from ten-wheeled passenger engines built by the Baldwins for American railways,
