

EMBEZZLEMENT FIZZLE.

Investigation Committee Met But No Evidence Was Forthcoming.

The committee, which is the whole school board, appointed to investigate the Hockenberry embezzlement charges, met in the Central school building last evening. Nearly 160 citizens were present to hear the proceedings. Chairman Hughes read the call and also the charges preferred by John J. Forbes.

It was stated in Monday's Tribune that Mr. Forbes would not be present to substantiate the charges and he was not. As the committee had no evidence to consider it adjourned without action and the disappointed assemblage filed away. A report will be formulated by the

committee later.




