Transportation of Corpses.

General Passenger Agent Lee, of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad company, has issued a circular to ticket agents notifying them that until further notice the minimum charge for a ticket issued for the transportation of a corpse will be one dollar (\$1.00), and in connection therewith the person in charge of the corpse must hold a regular first-class ticket for his or her personal transportation.

When transportation is desired for a corpse from one station to another, the local fare between which is less than one dollar (\$1.00), the minimum charge of one dollar (\$1.00) must be exacted, and the person in charge provided with a local ticket plainly endorsed "corpse," and this ticket must be accounted for at the rate, it being understood that the person or persons who will pay the regular local fare in effect between the two stations.

If the corpse is destined to a point to which the local fare is one dollar (\$1.00) or in excess of that amount, the regular local fares are to be collected and one of the tickets marked "corpse" and reported in the regular manner.

White Flags and Lights.

The following order was posted yesterday addressed to Lackawanna train dispatchers, conductors, engineers and operators:

"On and after Feb. 22, 1900, all wild cat or irregular trains on Northern, Southern and Bloomsburg divisions will display on front of engine two white flags by day and two white lights by night. This applies in every case except to engines working within yard limits.

Inventor of an Elevator.

John H. Moon, of Portland, Ore., has on exhibition in the store room at 265 Washington avenue a working model of a passenger and freight elevator of which he is the inventor. He is endeavoring to organize a stock company to place it on the market.

He claims that the elevator is an absolute safety and that in case of the cable breaking the elevator will be locked securely in the elevator shaft just where it is at the time. The elevator automatically opens and closes the doors leading to the elevator shaft at each floor.

Improving Coal Mines.

The Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron company is making a number of improvements to its mines in the Schuylkill region. At Good Spring a new slope is being sunk, which will cost \$25,000. A shaft is being put down at Lincoln which will drain the water

from all the openings in the mine, doing away with a dozen or more pumps. The shaft will be 950 feet deep, and will cost \$50,000, and when completed will open up a vast field of coal that will insure the operation of the colliery for many years.

Plans have been completed for the sinking of a shaft at Brookside to a depth of 1,000 feet, at an estimated cost of \$100,000. It is to be a three-way shaft, with two compartments for hauling coal and one from which the water from the entire mine will be taken.

To Weed Out "Imitations."

The trainmen on the Reading and Lebanon divisions of the Philadelphia and Reading railroad are now being examined as to their knowledge of the book of rules. The examinations are being made by practical and experienced officials, and the men are studying up. The questions put are in blank form and answers are to be appended. The officials are determined to have all understand the rules thoroughly, as the following circular, issued by Superintendent Bessler, will show:

"All trainmen: The committee is now engaged in examining all train and engine men. Should there be any who are not able to show sufficient knowledge of the rules and suitable proficiency in the matter of train orders, they will not be allowed to work until they can pass such examination.

"We intend to weed out the 'imitation' railroad men, and when this examination is finished have none in our service but those who are first-class railroad men by practical and experienced officials, and the men are studying up. The questions put are in blank form and answers are to be appended. The officials are determined to have all understand the rules thoroughly, as the following circular, issued by Superintendent Bessler, will show:

"To this end, all train and engine men are hereby instructed to carefully study their book of rules and the rules of the timetable. Learn the exact language of the book, the forms of orders as shown therein, as you must be able to repeat them and state what rights are conferred by the same.

"Signalmen, brakemen, baggage men and firemen must have the flagging rules 96 to 102 perfectly, and also be able to pass the examination on the general rules given in the timetable.

"These rules and special instructions are the foundation principles of your trade or profession. We will be glad to assist and instruct any who may not fully understand the same, but you must prepare yourselves by studying the rules so that when sent to Reading for examination you will know them or have questions to ask upon them. This means you."

Skeleton of a Mastodon Unearthed.

The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad is spending in the neighborhood of two million dollars in reducing grades and straightening curves on its main line between Chicago and Omaha. At Home, Ia., the line crosses the Skunk river, and there a gang of men have been employed excavating for the foundations of a new double-track iron bridge.

At a point fifteen feet below the river bed, under the quicksand and just above the blue clay strata Foreman Peter Mattson came across a T-shaped bone three feet high and four feet eight inches wide. It was taken out and carried in the tool car to Batavia where it now is. Those who have since examined the bone pronounce it to be undoubtedly part of the skeleton of an animal of prehistoric times, probably that of a mastodon.

Automatic Air-Brake Controller.

Fred Emery, of Dickson avenue, one of Scranton's mailcarriers, who recently secured letters patent upon an automatic air-brake controller for application upon passenger and freight trains. It is a chain connection between the valves of the hose-link connecting the cars, and by its operation there is no necessity for leaking the pipe when the brakes are set by a forcible disconnection of the air-brake valves, and no time is lost in getting the train again in motion.

Mr. Emery's application has already been tested, and its utility declared of the utmost importance in the mechanism of the steam air-brake. He will take out letters patent on his improvement.

B. & O. MAY ADVANCE WAGES.

Report That Engineers Are to Receive a Substantial Increase. Pittsburgh, Feb. 14.—The Pittsburgh Times says: "It was learned last night from sources which are considered reliable that the officials of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad will in a few days announce a substantial increase in the wages of all engineers employed on the Baltimore and Ohio system. The new schedule is expected to go into effect on March 1, 1900. The wages of about 3,500 would be affected by it. It is understood that, in addition to the advance in rate per hour, other concessions have been granted relating to overtime and extra service which make the new schedule more comprehensive in its effects than the rate advance indicates."
