

CASES TO BE TRIED IN COMMON PLEAS

CIVIL LIST FOR THE COMING MARCH TERM.

Suits That Were Brought as Late as Last May Appear on the List, Showing That the Business Is Within Nine Months of Being Up to Date, and the Nearest It Has Been in Years to Being Up to Date—Six Months Is About the Proper Margin.

Prothonotary Copeland has completed the making up of the common pleas trial list for the March term of court, which begins Monday, March 19. The list includes cases brought last May. This is the nearest the court has been to catching up with the civil business in many years.

It is not desirable to have the civil business brought down much closer than this. Six months is considered the proper limit. By having a reasonable time elapse between the filing and trying of suits opportunity is given for amicable settlements and the court is thus saved a large amount of work.
