CARBONDALE.

WM. J. MCMULLEN KILLED.

Trainmaster of Honesdale Branch Struck by a Locomotive.

William J. McMullen, trainmaster and track master of the Honesdale branch of the Delaware and Hudson railroad, was struck by a locomotive and instantly killed at No. 2 about a mile east of this city, last evening. shortly before 6 o'clock.

He was standing on the track and fell on the rail, the wheels mangling one side and arm considerably. The remains were brought to his residence on North Church street.

Mr. McMullen was born in Aldenville about sixty years ago and had worked for the company since he was 17 years old. He had charge of the old Gravity track and trains and was a familiar figure on the many big excursion trains run to Farview. In fact, it was largely due to his good judgment and careful attention to details that so many thousands of excursionists were transported each season without casualties.

Deceased is survived by a wife; two brothers, S. A. McMullen, of this city, and Charles McMullen, of Scranton. and one sister, Mrs. George Berry, of this city. The funeral arrangements have not been made.


