Susquehanna, March 11 .- The Lackwanna and Montrose passenger train from Montrose and Alford had a very narrow escape on Friday morning. One man started towards Montrose to flag the train as t came down the heavy grade, while the other ran to Alford to get the section men to remove the obstruction and to repair the track. The train was stopped when it was within a few rods of the tree, and the passengers walked down the grade and over the big trestle to Alford station. If the train had struck the obstruction it would have been whirled down the steep mountain side and into the valbelow, a distance of several huney
