

THE BATTLESHIP KEARSARGE.

Considered the Finest Type of Battleship in the Navy.

The battleship Kearsage, which recently made her first trial trip in charge of her regular officers and crew, is considered the finest type of warship which has yet been added to the American navy, Marine experts are of the opinion that she is the equal of any vessel affoat in armament, power and destructive possibilities. Although literally a floating fortress, the Kearsarge has really a beautiful model and sets in the water like a yacht. This, according to Collier's Weekly, is partly due to the extent of her upper works. The Kearsarge is 368 feet long, 72 feet 2½ inches beam, and draws 25 feet of water with all her stores and ammunition aboard, including her coal supply, which is 1.209 tons, or enough to allow her to cross the Atlantic and back at a moderate speed without recoaling.

She carries four of the heaviest guns ever placed on a man-of-war-13-inch rifles, which will throw a projectile further than those of the Indiana or Oregon. In connection with the main five cents. main gun turrets range from 15 inches to 17 inches in thickness. No warship in the world is more heavily armored than the Kearsarge, while everything about her is practically fire-proof. She cost \$5,000,000, and naval experts say she is well worth it.
