FIRST WRECK ON THE BRANCH.

Bad Smashup at the Foot of the Mountain Road.

A wreck occurred on the Honesdale branch of the Delaware and Hudson between Farview and Waymart on Monday night, which resulted in the death of one man and the serious intury of two more. Along train of care had got away from the crew and jumped the track at Swackhammer's cut, one of the most dangerous places the new road.

Thirty cars were plled in confusion at the entrance of the cut when the wrecking gang, accompanied by Trainmaster McMullen, Master Mechanic W. R. Johnson and Dr. H. C. Wheeler arrived on the scene, Flagman Edward Cavanaugh was dead and two other their stay here have made many trainmen injured. The dead man's home was in Honesdale, as is that of the other two unfortunate men.

As the trainmen tell the story, they left Farview a little after 9 o'clock left Farview a little after 9 o'clock with him for a prosperous and success-and were running down the monutain ful future in his new charge. at a fair rate of speed when at Swackhammer's one of the cars left the track up near the engine. At this point the grade is very heavy and once the car left the rails, those behind it began to pile up, burying the trainmen in the coal and debris.

Conductor Gilbert Tucker, Engineer Wood Miller and Fireman Long were not injured and began at once the search for the unfortunate men who were out on the train. Brakeman Simmons was first found in an un onscious condition and he was carried to one side to await the arrival of a doctor. Another brakeman was slightly in jured, and after a long and careful search Cavanaugh's body was found. but the spirit of life had flown.

The general opinion is that the rails spread and derailed the car and acme think that the car broke down. Notaing official can be learned. Dr. H. C Wheeler made Brakeman Simmons as comfortable as possible and about 8 o'clock had him removed to Emerget.cy hospital in this city. He is badly bruised about the face, chest and lower limbs, and it is feared is injured internally.




