With the beginning of mild weather the Lehigh Valley is enlarging its con-struction forces considerably, and pushing improvement work planned some time ago. Delays have also affected the company in the receipt of new equipment ordered last year. There have now been delivered, however, more than half the 275 thirty-ton box ears ordered last fall. In addition there have been put in service the last of orders for 1.000 fiftyton steel and 1,000 forty-ton wooden coal cars. These for the most part renow been almost entirely removed from the company's lines. There are probably 200 of them still in service and these will soon be demolished, How rapidly these small coal cars have been disposed of may be realized from the fact that 12,300 were in service in November, 1895. In the following year 6,800 were disposed of, and now practically the last of the remaining 5,500 have been retired. \*
