## POOR FARM SEWAGE CAUSES LITIGATION

### PROTEST AGAINST POLLUTION OF A STREAM

#### Case of O. D. Hollister Against the Poor District Which Was Instituted Before Judge Gunster Was Argued Yesterday Before Judge Archbald—Poplar Street Crossing Case to Be Heard Today—Will of the Late G. W. Fritz—Other Court Matters Told in Brief.

Arguments were heard, yesterday, by Judge Archbald, in the equity case of O. D. Hollister against the Scranton Poor district. The testimony in the case was taken before the late Judge Gunster, and after his death, submitted to Judge Archbald by agreement.

Mr. Hollister, for himself and other farmers living along a stream passing through the poor farm, seeks an injunction to prevent the Hillside Home sewage from being emptied into the stream. He claims the pollution has caused fatal sickness to several of his cows and that if it is persisted in it will do him and his neighbors irreparable damage.

### TO AMEND COUNTY RULES.

The members of the newly organized Democratic club met Monday night in Guernsey's hall and transacted a large amount of routine business. The most important thing done was the appointment of a committee to formulate a plan for the amendment of the present county rules, and plan to be presented at the next county convention.

It was also maintained that Mr. Murphy has never qualified himself, and never can qualify himself, under the act by virtue of which he claims election, as that act specifies that "the votes shall be taken to the Wyoming house and there counted," etc., all of which is a physical impossibility, because of the non-existence of the Wyoming house.
