COMPANIES AT CATASAUQUA.

W. W. Watson of This City Is One of the Men Interested in the Project-The D., L. & W. Board for Today-Order with Reference to Air Brake Instructions-Directions Issued About the Care of Lanterns of Lackawanna Employes-Other Matters of Interest.

A new company to conduct the gas and electric light business in Catasauqua and other places was formed under the name of the Lehigh-Northampton Gas and Electric company, with headquarters at No. 119 Bridge street, Catasauqua. It was incorporated under the privileges of the New Jersey laws, with a capital of \$250,000. At an election, M. L. Dreisbach, of Wilkes-Barre, was chosen president; Lyddon Flick, of Wilkes-Barre, vice-president, and C. R. Horn, of Catasauqua, secretary and treasurer, which three officials comprise the executive committee. The directors also include Mr. Sterling, of Wilkes-Barre, and W. W. Watson, of

The Catasauqua plants have been absorbed, and will be considerably enlarged, the gas works having a new holder erected, and otherwise improved, An interesting programme will be arand the electric light plant increased power. The present system of furnishing current in Catasauqua will be retained, but in other places the alternating system will be introduced.

The company proposes extending their lines of wire and pipe to Coplay. Northampton, Siegfried and Cementon, and will introduce every improve ment in the system employed. Work on construction will be given to many more men. Both gas and electric plants are model modern institutions, and the additional outlay will be used in constructing new fields of demand, the present machinery being abundantly able to cover a more extended field.

Care of Lanterns.

General Superintendent E. G. Russell, of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad company, has issued the following instructions for care of lanterns:

Do not fill the fount too full; leave at least half an inch space. This gives room for the expansion of the oil. The wicks should be renewed at least once in four weeks. He sure they are perfectly dry be-fore using. Keep the top of the wick tube scraped clean.

Do not draw out threads from the wick, to decreases your oil supply and causes the wirk to fit so loosely in the tube that it is liable to

Keep the wick tube full size so as to allow the oil to flow 'reely to the flame.

COMPROMISE IS NOT AN IMPOSSIBLITY

CONFERENCE BETWEEN SALOON MEN AND MR. STURGES.

If the Licensed Dealers Will Enter Into a Guaranteed Compact to Strictly Obey the Law, and in Rooting Out the Speakeasies, the Chances Are the Prosecutions for Sunday Selling Will Be Nol Prossed-Interview with a Prominent Crusader-New Warrants.

It is quite possible that the cases against the licensed liquor dealers, charged with selling on Sunday, will never go to trial, even though true bills are returned by the grand jury. If the licensed dealers will agree, under bond or some equally sufficient guarantee, that they will religiously live up to the law, the prosecutions may be

Before leaving on a business trip to New York, Monday morning, E. E. Sturges; the moving spirit in the crusade, was waited upon by a delegation of the licensed dealers. What was said or done has not developed, further than that another meeting was arranged to take place between Mr. Sturges and the committee, after the hotel men have their meeting tonight.

All we want Is to remedy the evils existing in this city, and the easiest and most effective way is the one we prefer to adopt. "As to the speakeasies, however, there is to be no compromise," he went on to say. "There are no mitigating circumstances in their case, as is claimed there is in the case of the licensed dealers, but whether there are or not, the same arrangement could not be made with them for obvious reasons. They will be rooted out and prosecuted, one after another, until there is not a single hole-in-the-wall left in the county."
