> States in March include 11,046 tons of anthracite and 622,463 tons of bituminous, a total of 743,509 tons, as compared with 402,076 tons last year; the increase being 341.433 tons. For the nine months of the fiscal year, from July 1st to March 31st, the exports were 3.682,675 tons for 1899 and 5,267,-678 tons this year; showing a gain of 1,585,003 tons or 43 per cent. The increase in shipments to Canada was 1,453,001 tons and to Mexico 127,803 tons. The exports to Europe were 109.414 tons this year and 28.168 tons last year; a large proportionate in-crease, though the total is still small. The trade to South America and the West Indies showed a small decrease. Our total exports were less than three per cent. of our production.

Not an Incurable Defect.

The omission of a revenue stamp on a legal document is not an incurable error, Judge Archbald says, in an opinion filed yesterday in the case of M. A. Scanlon, administratrix, against Edward Burke.

The defendant was a tenant of the plaintiff's hotel property, corner of Main avenue and Lafayette street. Judgment was entered on a confession in the lease for rent amounting to \$116. The defendant sought to have the judgment stricken off on the ground that, at the time the lease was executed, no United States internal revenue stamps were affixed, as required by law. After the judgment was entered the plaintiff, by her attorney, Thomas P. Duffy, went before Internal Revenue Collector Penman, confessed to the neglect, paid the prescribed penalty of \$10 and had the stamp affixed. This, Judge Archbald says, cures the

defect. The judge remarks: It is not every emission of a stamp that makes the unstamped instrument invalid, the court says, but only where it has been emitted with intent to evade the law; the other restrictions simply affect, not the validity, but the use of the document; it is not to be received in evidence or allowed to be registered or record-

The remedial features of the statute in re-lief of the penal part of it are to be liberally and not narrowly construed, and when the act properly stamped by the collector, shall be held stamped originally, how can we say that it shall not? valid to all intents and purposes, the same as if

MADE A CONFESSION.

Another Development in the Corcoran Murder Case.

It is probable that the brutal murder of Michael Corcoran, of Duryea, on December 3, 1898, will be avenged. One of the men implicated in the crime has made a confession, and although he mentioned no names the detectives expect to succeed in their efforts.

The man who made the confession lived in Wilkes-Barre. Several weeks ago he was placed in jail on some trivial charge and was taken ill, dying a few days ago. A short time before his death he stated that he and two other men had planned to rob Corcoran's place. One of the men is working somewhere in this part of the state, and the third man is in the west. When they broke into Corcoran's place

They forced open the door, and by this time Corcoran was awake and was against the door. Although Corcoran was of powerful build there were three against him, and the door was forced open a little way. One of the men then became excited, and pulling out a revolver, placed it in the narrow aperture in the door and fired. The bullet went into Corcoran's neck. The three then went into the room and bound the Monohan woman, who had by this time appeared. The robbers and murderers broke open the safe and got \$53. -Wilkes-Barre Record.


