CRIMINAL LIST FOR THE JUNE SESSIONS

TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY-FOUR CASES TO BE TRIED.

Among the Cases on the List Are Thirty-eight in Which Violations of the Liquor Laws Are Alleged. Lexow, Bribery and Slot Machine Cases Are Also Down For Trial. Five Libel Cases Against Little and O'Toole of Scrantonian—Judges Savage and Cameron to Assist.

First the Lexow, then the crusade, and then the awakening of the constables which these two events and Judge Archbald's charge caused, are responsible for a big list for the June sessions of criminal court. Two hundred and forty-seven cases are set down to be tried during the two weeks.

Sixteen liquor license cases, in which private parties or constables appear as prosecutors, and twenty-two of these cases instituted by the crusaders are scattered throughout the list. The Lexow cases against H. T. Fellows, E. J. Maloney and Martin Clark are set down for Wednesday, June 6, and those against E. A. Knight and Constable Joseph F. Woelkers are scheduled for trial, Monday, June 11.

The cases brought by Banker E. F. Ames, of Forest City, against his wife, Anna E. Ames, and his neighbor, Dr. C. R. Knapp, and the Nolan patrie case from Carbondale are on the list for the opening day, Monday, June 4. The Chiprino murder case from Jessup, and five libel cases against Little and O'Toole, of the Scrantonian, are included in the list for the first day of the second week.

At the request of District Attorney John R. Jones, three courts will be conducted each week. During the first week Judge H. M. Edwards will preside in No. 1; Judge John P. Kelly in No. 2, and President Judge Clinton R. Savage, of the Eighth Judicial district, in No. 3. President Judge R. W. Archbald will preside in No. 1, during the second week; Hon. H. M. Edwards in No. 2, and President Judge David Cameron, of the Fourth Judicial district, in No. 3.

It is the intention of District Attorney Jones to clear up the list, as he is desirous that no cases shall go over to the October term, which is usually the heaviest of the year. The list is as follows:

ing, it is still necessary to know how it is growing. The millions of India are increasing, but it is by a process of many births and many deaths. In good years millions are born; in times of famine millions die, the population increasing because a few more are born than die. It is growth, but savage growth. There is a more excellent kind of progress, that resulting from the combination of a moderate birth rate and a small death rate. The marital statistics collected by the census are in many respects very interesting. Thus, the extent and power of the anti-marital forces can be estimated in a way by ascertaining the proportion of people between 55 and 64 years of age who have never been married. Census statistics show that the proportion of unmarried females between these ages is greatest in the east, in North Carolina, Rhode Island and Massachusetts, for instance, while the proportion is smallest in the west, South Dakota, Utah and Oklahoma bringing up the rear in the order named.

THE CONTRAST. Men, on the contrary, are far more likely to remain single in the west than in the east. The proportion of unmarried men between 55 and 64 is lowest in the southern states, e. g., Arkansas, Alabama and Georgia, and greatest in the block of western states west of the Mississippi. In Nevada 38.2 per cent. of the males between 55 and 64 have never been married, Idaho coming next with 34.4 per cent., Montana next with 29.5 per cent., etc. That marriage is still pre-eminently the sphere of women seems to be indicated by the fact that more women marry than men, and they marry at earlier ages. Thus, only 31 per cent. of females 15 years of age and over are unmarried, while among males of the same ages the proportion is 41 per cent. Taking girls and boys between 15 and 20 years of age, it is found that one out of every ten girls is married, while among the boys the proportion falls to one in two hundred. These were the proportions in 1890. Whether these conditions have changed since then is a question that can only be answered by the census of 1900.

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
