CONFERENCE WITH MT. PLEAS. ANT STRIKERS NOT HELD.

Men Say They Must Now Be Dealt with as Members of the United Mine Workers and Not as Employes of the Fuller Coal Company. Make-up of the D., L. & W. Board for Today-Erie Testing a New Marker for the Rear of Its Trains.

The employes of the Mt. Pleasant mines who have been out on strike for weeks and Superintendent Neale did not have the expected conference last night. The men had been givn to understand that the superintendent desired to confer with them at St. David's hall as employes of the Fuller Coal company, but not as members of the United Mine Workers, and a large number assembled in the vicinity of the hall.

After waiting until after 9 o'clock, they dispersed. It was learned during the evening that several workmen who took the strikers' places, met in the prop yard at the breaker entrance and had a conference with Superintendent Neale at 6.30 o'clock. What the outcome of the conference was could not

One of the strikers said last night: "If Superintendent Neale has any proposition to make to the men, we are not aware of it. We were willing to effect a settlement on a reasonable basis, as employes of the Fuller Coal company, had any such offer been made to us, but now if Mr. Neale wants to meet us it must be as the members of the United Mine Workers of Amer-



Feature of Domestic News Is the Steady Progress Toward a Lower Level of Prices.

New York, June 1.-R. G. Dun & Company's Weekly Review of Trade will say tomorrow:

The most conspicuous feature of demestic news is that steady progress toward a lower level of prices for the chief materials of industry. Prices of wool have declined and there is much it regularity in prices of manufactured woolen

There is also more complaint of cancellations, and on this occasion in cotton as well as wooter goods, with prices adjusted to a lower range all the textile branches might expect greater activ-ity. The change in hides has made marked progress also, the average at Chicago declining over 3 per cent, for the last week.
