#### This and That.

William Stein, of Shenandoah, was elected mine inspector of the Sixth or Shenandoah anthracite district to succeed himself Saturday, upon the one hundred and sixty-second ballot, after several sittings recently by the board to examine applicants. He is the father of Dr. James Stein, of this city. An approved bond of indemnity wa

filed at Honesdale by the Delaware an Southern railroad Thursday, by which the Erie and Wyoming company are secured for land taken at Lackawaxer by the former company. The amoun of the bond is \$10,000, and Judge Purdy ruled that the Delaware and Southern company is not to take possession for thirty days, thus allowing the Eric and Wyoming time to secure an injunction, if so desired .- Susquehanna

A committee made up of one repre-sentative from each of the branches of the Lehigh Valley railroad visited Superintendent Wilbur, at Bethlehem, on Saturday, and presented a petition praying for an equalization of wages among brakemen. If the demand is granted the local men will receive \$2 for twelve hours work. The men on the Wyoming division receive 5 cents more per day than those employed or the Hazleton division, while the men on other divisions are paid a much higher rate.

The Chauncey colliery, which has been operated by George and Thomas Mellen, at Avondale, Plymouth township, has changed hands and will hereafter be operated by the firm of George F. Lee & Son, of this city. The deal went into effect on Saturday. The members of the new firm are well known and conduct a general store at Avondale, where they have carried on the business for a number of years. Thomas Carrigan, of Nanticoke, has been appointed inside foreman under the new management.-Wilkes-Barre

#### LICENSE TAX ORDINANCE. Its Supporters Are Working Hard for Its Passage.

The supporters of the recently amended license tax ordinance are doing yeoman service in endeavoring to secure enough votes for its passage in select council and are very sanguine of ultimate success. The measure will then have to go back to common council for concurrence and the result in that branch is very much in doubt.

"This is by far the most important measure now pending in councils," said a prominent select councilman who was in city hall yesterday, "and if it is passed as amended last Thursday night in select council it will mean the addition of between \$25,000 and \$30,-000 to the city treasury next year.

"The tax of \$1,000 on the large corporations using the city streets would bring in about \$8,000, and 5 per cent. of the gross receipts of the street railway company would mean at a very conservative estimate upwards of \$15,-000. All of the objectionable features of last year's measure are excluded, and, to my mind, the measure is now

### ALEX. GRASS ARRESTED. He Is Accused of Receiving Stolen

from the company. About sixty pounds of copper wire, springs, etc., were found at his shop, which goods are valued by the com-pany at about \$40. Grass was held in \$500 bail, Thomas Hayden becom-

ing his bondsman. An enormous amount of this copper wire has been stolen from the company, and several cases have already been instituted against junk dealers for the purchasing of the copper.
