TAX LEVY FIXED BY POOR BOARD. IT WILL BE THREE AND ONE-HALF MILLS ON DOLLAR. This Will Make the Net Revenue of the District from Taxes \$78,523.22, and That Coming from Other Sources Will Make the Total Revenue \$149,235.22—An Addition to the Home is Necessary Which Will Cost at Least \$40,000. Some of the Cases Considered.

Shotton and Fuller, presented their annual report, recommending that the tax levy for the year 1900 should be fixed at three and one-half mills on the dollar, on the assessed valuation of the district, which has been adjusted by the county commissioners at \$24,864,530 for Scranton and Dunmore.

we herewith submit our estimate showing the probable revenues and expenditures of the district for the year 1900, as follows: EXPENDITURES. Salaries and Services \$22,000.00. Outer-door relief \$18,000.00. Supplies \$24,000.00. Printing and stationery \$17,000.00. Furniture \$1,000.00. Insurance \$2,000.00. Miscellaneous \$800.00. Total \$85,800.00.

Amount to be received from state of Pennsylvania \$50,000.00. Amount to be received from poor tenants \$3,000.00. Total \$53,000.00. Exceeding the estimate by \$32,800.00. It is desired that the revenues should exceed the expenses for the reason that for some years ago it has been customary for the board to be borrowers at the time they become due monthly.

"I don't drink whiskey," he exclaimed wrathfully, but added playfully, "beer is my limit." He was dismissed by a unanimous vote. Dr. Payne, in making the report for the Hillside Home committee, said that there are a large number of small children at the home who should be indentured to the Home for the Friendless and St. Patrick's orphanage, and called the board's attention to the fact. Secretary Gillespie read a number of bills, which were ordered paid, after which the meeting adjourned.

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
