METROPOLITAN RAILWAY IS TO USE MORE AIR POWER.

President H. H. Vreeland Says Compresesd Air Is to Be Used on a Number of the Crosstown Lines. Contractors Suffer the Loss of Property Through Vandalism-The Promotion of Chief Clerk Reigert, of Superintendent Russell's Office. Make Up of D., L. & W. Board.

In an interview published in the morning papers with H. H. Vreeland, president of the Metropolitan Street Railway, he stated: "Our experience in providing underground electric traction for the Fifty-ninth and Twentythird streets crosstown lines demonstrated that the removal and replacement of the pipe obstructions along the avenues was so costly as to render underground crosstown building almost prohibitive, and we are, in consequence, making extensive experiments with traction systems, which will obviate this great outlay, as, for instance, on the Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets lines, with compressed air, and on the Thirty-fourth street line, where we are preparing to test the storage battery system. "It would have been quite as reasonable to have said we were going to abandon electricity when we began experiments with air power, as to say

now we are to abandon air power because we undertake to experiment with the storage battery. So far from abandoning the use of air power, we are equipping the Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets roads with new heavy ralls, and are awaiting an entire new equipment of cars with a different type of motor from those now in use, in which all the defects experimentally developed in the first lot are climinated. These cars will be delivered within a few weeks."-Mail and Express.




