FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF MR. AND MRS. J. B. SNYDER.

Fittingly Observed at Their Home on Washburn Street Yesterday Afternoon and Evening—Young Man from Carbondale Slightly Demented—Death of a Former Resident at Pen Argyl—Entertainment at No. 14 School—Coffee Notes and Personals.

The happy couple were showered with congratulations, and the well wishes for a long and prosperous life were extended by the callers throughout the day. Mr. and Mrs. Snyder were seated in the reception room and greeted their friends as they passed through the spacious rooms. They were assisted in receiving by their three sons and their wives, Mr. and Mrs. Byron J. Snyder, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel H. Snyder, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Snyder.

In the adjoining rooms the guests were entertained, and in the front room on the second floor could be seen the many gifts received. Among the countless tokens were noted contributions of gold and silver, bric-a-brac, linen, furniture, etc., which were greatly admired by all who were privileged to see them. Altogether there was fully \$200 in gold coins and upwards of \$300 worth of presents.

The great difficulty with all the sewer contractors seems to be their inability to secure a sufficient amount of sewer pipe, all the large factories being behind in their orders.
