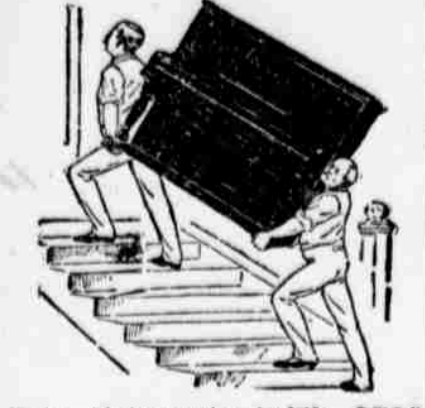

ANOTHER VICTORY FOR THE NEW ROAD

TENOR AND EFFECT OF JUDGE SIMONTON'S DECISION.

Quo Warranto Proceedings Instituted by the Erie to Obstruct the Construction of the Hawley-Lackawanna Branch of the Erie and Wyoming Are Decided in Favor of the Latter—No Question of Bad Faith Between the Defendant and the Commonwealth.

The decision by Judge J. W. Simonton, of Dauphin county, in the quo warranto proceedings over the Erie and Wyoming Valley Railroad company's right to construct its proposed connecting link between Hawley and Lackawanna is another signal victory for the promoters of the new Delaware Valley and Kingston road. When the decision has been received in the Supreme court, to which tribunal it is to be appealed, there will be an end to the litigation at present pending in this state between the opponents to the construction of the new road. It is not the end of the fight, however. Today in Albany the appellate division of the Supreme court is to review the finding of the New York state railroad commissioners, which it will be remembered, reported favorably upon the application for permission to construct the new road, which was so vigorously opposed by the Erie company.

HEARING POSTPONED

No hearing has as yet been held in the case of Walsh & O'Connor, the Lackawanna avenue hotel keepers, charged with having sold liquor last Sunday. The hearing was postponed because many were present but the attorneys failed to appear owing to a misunderstanding and the case went over. A new date was not fixed yesterday.

Davis, who was arrested there on a warrant issued by Alderman Howe, at the instance of Mrs. Elizabeth Hiley, proprietress of the Parrot House on Washington avenue, who charged him with defrauding her of a board bill of \$4. He will give a hearing before Alderman Howe this morning.

A Drug Left to Kill Dogs Almost Ended the Life of Little Philip Waltisburger.

Philip, the infant son of Philip Waltisburger, proprietor of the Linden Street Cash Market, at 619 Linden street, was a very sick child yesterday morning, and had it not been for prompt medical attention would have died, as a result of poisoning. Two black dogs, Nig and Fannie, which belonged to the establishment, died Sunday of poisoning, and Mr. Waltisburger is now very much on the alert to find the person who has so indiscriminately distributed the deadly stuff, which is endangering the lives of members of his family.

MADE ANSWER

The Erie and Wyoming made answer that it proposed to build the line in question under authority of the "branching" power accorded by Section 9, of the Act of April 9, 1888, under which it is chartered, and which reads as follows: "Any company incorporated under this act shall have authority to construct such branches from its main line as it may deem necessary to increase its business and accommodate the trade and travel of the public."

QUESTIONS OF GOOD FAITH

"We are not sure that we apprehend precisely what is meant by counsel by the alleged agent in good faith. We understand that the question of good faith is a question between the commonwealth and the defendant, and that when the latter honestly and fairly states its real purpose in wishing to build the branch, and intends to build it, it is acting in good faith. If we are correct in this, there can be no doubt here, for it is, as we have seen, conceded that the defendant has honestly and fairly stated that the purpose is to connect with the road to Kingston; and it certainly intends to build the branch.

NOTICE SERVED ON THE COMPANY

ORDERED TO MOVE TOLL-GATE FROM NAY AUG PARK.

President Simpson Said to a Tribune Man That They Will Not Move the Toll-gate and the Matter Will Have to Be Fought Out in the Courts—City Solicitor Vosburg Will Ask One of the Judges Today to Revoke the License of the Company to Collect Toll.

Street Commissioner Thomas yesterday served notice on President C. D. Simpson, of the Nay Aug Falls and Elmhurst Boulevard company, that in pursuance with the provisions of a resolution recently adopted by both councils the company's toll-gate in Nay Aug park must be removed at once. President Simpson received the notice and later in the day informed a Tribune man that the company, acting upon the advice of its attorneys, Willard, Warren & Knapp, would not remove the toll-gate, leaving the matter to be fought out in the courts. Just what legal reasons impel the company to this course will not yet be divulged. It is understood, however, that just at present the officials of the company consider the resolution not binding, inasmuch as a proposition made by them to gain by it, the city solicitor having decided that the company cannot legally collect toll within the park limits, should this proposition be accepted, the city would have to keep the road in repair mainly for the company's use, they argue.

JUDGMENT DIRECTED

"Judgment is therefore directed to be entered in favor of the defendant, if exceptions be not filed within the time limited by law."

CONVENTION OF K. OF C.

Honesdale Council Takes the Initiative in the Movement—Sister Councils to Be Invited.

Honesdale council, Knights of Columbus, held a meeting last Tuesday evening, presided over by Grand Knight Thomas Flinerty, at which it was proposed to arrange for a grand convention of all the councils of Knights in this section of the country. The proposition was considered at length and finally adopted by a unanimous vote.

HAD NOT COMPLIED

In his opinion read in special council on the evening of June 2, Mr. Vosburg called attention to the fact that the Elmhurst Boulevard company had not complied with the provisions of this act, as they had taken out no license and, accordingly, could not legally collect toll. The next morning, June 8, the attorneys of the company applied to court for such a license.
