The lights for the chancel and baptistry are all concealed behind the arches and every light in the building is to be covered with a holophane shade, which softens and diffuses the light. While the scaffolding in the auditorium at present makes it look smaller than it really is, the work is far enough along to give one an idea of what a beautiful place it will be when it is completed. The screens and chancel rail are of quartered oak. exquisitely carved.
