

Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Reprocentatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following is proposed as an amendment to the Commonwealth of Penn-sylvania in accordance with the provisions of the Eighteenth article thereof. Amendment. Strike out section four of article eight, and in-ment in place thereof, as follows: Section 4.
